## The Dash is Everything

You know those emails you get that have been forwarded 500 times to 5,000 people? Some are annoying; some are silly. But some richly reward us for not hitting "Delete" too quickly. I received two such emails around Thanksgiving, one from alumnus Cerese Blanton Feagans, SON 2001, and one from a dear college friend. Their timing was perfect because Thanksgiving is my favorite holiday for pondering all that's right with the world. More significantly, my grandson had just entered the world, a beautiful child, lovingly named by his parents in memory of my father. Thus, my heart was already mush when these two emails arrived to touch my life.

The first contained a newsletter from Barbara Mintzer, motivational writer and speaker, which in turn contained "The Dash," a poem by Linda Ellis. It's too long to reprint here, nor do I have the author's permission, but the gist is this: When someone dies, we place great significance on listing the year of birth and death, with just a tiny dash between the two. In fact, it is only that tiny dash that matters. The dash represents all the time that person spent alive on earth, all the lives touched, all the memories made. That email has led me to reflect many times since then on how intentionally I am "spending my dash."

The second email, the one from my college friend, may be one you've seen. It is thoughts from columnist Erma Bombeck, who succumbed to cancer a few years ago, about what she'd do differently if she had her life to live over. Two lines resonate with me: "I'd cry less and laugh less over movies, and cry and laugh more over life," and "I'd invite more people over despite the stain on the carpet and the frayed chair." In other words, she'd have been mindful of the dash!

My wish for you this holiday season: Focus on the DASH. It is all that counts.

### Our Students: Competency and Commitment

We have just received the scores and statistics for the 2006 January and August graduating classes. In the testing cycles based on quarters, students from these two classes scored 125 points above the scaled mean, which included hospital and university-based programs. One January student scored in the top 6% of the nation, two August students scored in the top 3% nationally and one student scored in the top 4%. These are wonderful achievements; we congratulate our students.

### 2006 Accomplishments Make Us Proud

One thing is certain – the Radiologic Technology Program has achieved successful outcomes for the year 2006! A re-cap of measurement results includes:

- 60% of the students admitted to the program in 2004 graduated from the program in 2006.
- Student learning outcomes reflect JRC/ERT standards, as indicated by the fact that 100% of the graduates sitting for the ARRT credentialing examination passed at first attempt.
- Placement data indicates that 83% of those eligible were placed within the profession immediately following graduation; 90% of those placed were within Carolinas Health-Care System.
  - 100% of the faculty met the requirements to maintain ARRT credentialing.
  - 100% of the program's mission, goals and outcomes are consistent with CCHS mission, goals and outcomes.
  - The program maintained criteria for JRCERT accreditation to include submission of annual membership fee, annual report, and Application/Self-Study Report with on-site visit scheduled for spring 2007.
- 100% of the graduates are effective communicators in the medical environment.
- 100% of the graduates developed and demonstrated problem solving and critical thinking skills.
- 100% of the employers indicate satisfaction with the graduates' ability to perform entry-level expectations in the role of a competent radiographer.

None of these outstanding outcomes could have been met without the commitment and teamwork of our extraordinary alumni faculty: Lucy, Patty, and Cathey. The program looks forward to a productive year 2007!

### Advancing Our Profession

During the week of September 16<sup>th</sup>- 22<sup>nd</sup> we celebrated National Surgical Technology Week. The students were treated to lunch following a very busy morning in clinical. The faculty provided an overview of the Association of Surgical Technology, the professional organization I encourage all of you to join. If you are a member and receiving the monthly journal, you no doubt have read about the efforts of AST in advancing the profession. The most significant of these is minimum educational and/or credentialing standards. They are proposing that individuals employed as Surgical Technologists must either:

1. hold the CST credential administered by the National Board for Surgical Technology and Surgical Assisting (NBSTSA), formerly the Liaison Council on Certification for the Surgical Technologist;
2. have completed a program in Surgical Technology accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP);
3. have completed a military training program.

The latest state to pass legislation based on this standard is Tennessee. The law that passed in 2004 in that state became effective in July, 2006. The law also provided a "grandfathering" mechanism for those already employed in the field.

As graduates of a CAAHEP-accredited program here at Carolinas College of Health Sciences, you can feel good about the legislative efforts of the Association of Surgical Technology on behalf of our profession.

We currently have 12 students enrolled in their second semester. They will begin their third and final semester in January and look forward to continuing their clinical training with many of you as their mentors.

## Honoring Susan Stricker's Legacy

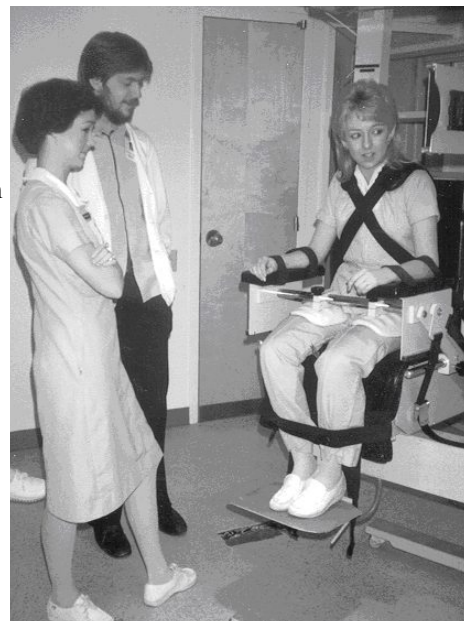

**Tara Noble, SOST 1997**, came to CCHS with a BS in Biology from UNC Charlotte. Having especially enjoyed her orthopedic rotation, she took a position at CMC after graduation, primarily working with the orthopedic team. Several years later, curious about surgical care in other regions of the country, she took several assignments with a traveling agency. Working for three months at San Luis Hospital in Obispo, CA, she found that area of the country to be much more focused on health and fitness than her native South. Funds for the student lamps were generously provided by the Alumni Association.

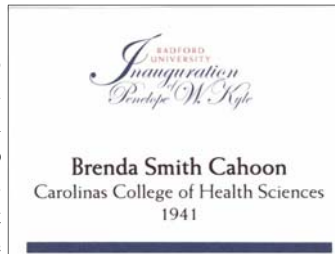


# CMH Alumnus Represents CCHS at Radford Inauguration



Brenda Smith Cahoon, Charlotte Memorial Nursing Class of 1964, isn't one to pass up an opportunity, and she thanked her lucky stars for that in October as she sat just a few feet away from actress Sally Struthers at a symposium led by Dr. Maya Angelou! Afterward she wrote to CCHS President Ellen Sheppard, "Thank you for allowing me to represent the school at the Radford Inauguration of President Penelope W. Kyle. It was an honor and a privilege and an experience I shall never forget!"

When Sheppard receives invitations to inaugurations she cannot attend, she often extends them to CCHS alumni in the university's vicinity. Cahoon, who lives in Clarksville, Virginia, which is some distance from Radford, didn't hesitate to accept the offer when she



learned internationally acclaimed poet Maya Angelou was a keynote presenter. ## CCHS Student Selected as Janssen Scholar

If she wasn't going to be a nurse, perhaps Cindy Gilmer might have considered acting. Imagine combining the bright eyed eagerness of Julie Andrews in the 60's "Sound of Music," the resilience of the 80's TV "it girl" Mary Richards, the resourcefulness of Jodie Foster's Claire in "Silence of the Lambs," and the intelligence of 2006's Marilyn vos Savant. Visualize that and you have an idea who Cindy Gilmer is and why she was selected as a 2006 Janssen Scholar, a designation which won her an all-expense-paid trip to Long Beach, California, to the 20<sup>th</sup> annual conference of the American Psychiatric Nursing Association (APNA).

**100% of CCHS Students Pass Required Certification/Licensure Exams on First Writing in 100% of Programs!**

Graduates from four of the colleges' diploma and degree health-care programs must pass an external exam in order to be licensed, registered, or certified for their profession\*. The percent of graduates who pass is a critical benchmark of success in healthcare education. Low pass rates jeopardize a program's accreditation and frustrate students and faculty. High pass rates generally indicate the "perfect storm" of good students, excellent curriculum, and phenomenal instruction. This year, CCHS achieved the penultimate. As this issue of *Connections* goes to press, all of its 2006 graduates who have taken a required certification exam have passed on the first attempt.

\*Certification is not currently required of surgical technologists in the Charlotte area.

A prominent cover story in the local section of the *Charlotte Observer* recently detailed the grand opening of an adult day center owned by CCHS alumnus Nate Huggins and his wife, Vivian. Nate, who had earned an MBA before coming to CCHS, is well qualified for this combination business owner/nurse role, and – to quote the *Charlotte Observer* – “[He has] the biggest smile on his face, the kind of smile that comes from knowing you’re doing exactly what you were put on this Earth to do.”

## New spot for adult day care

Next Sunday, caregivers and older adults will have the opportunity to tour the new Blessed Assurance Adult Day and Health Care Services as it opens its expanded location.

Originally located in Matthews, this nonprofit adult day care began serving older adults in 1998 when the southern part of Mecklenburg County was largely underserved by Charlotte-based businesses and agencies. From its location in Mint Hill, Blessed Assurance will be able to serve the southeastern part of the county as well as the Union County area.

This adult day care, and others like it, seek to provide a social environment that promotes the independence of the older adult. Programs that include a health-care service component, like Blessed Assurance, provide things such as physical and occupational therapies, medication administration and daily health care assessments, and are better suited to respond to the specialized needs of clients with Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease or diabetes.

As an added safety feature, the new facility will also have an AED (automated external defibrillator) as well as a full-scale surveillance system on the premises to provide an added layer of

# Learning Fair Continues As Popular Student Service

Again in 2006, the annual fair at which various colleges and universities visit CCHS to vie for its students' interest was a popular information-gathering activity for students. CCHS believes that part of its mission is to create in students a love of learning that will propel them to continue their education and the pursuit of additional academic credentials after graduating and entering a healthcare profession. On November 2, nine colleges and universities gave out information to over 200 CCHS students.

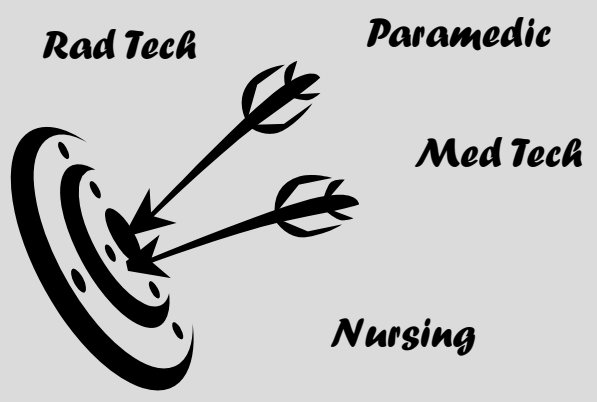
And there's more!

For the **Radiologic Technology** program, this was the 20th time in the last 21 years that 100% pass rate has been achieved.

The School of **Medical Technology** scores were 125 points above the scaled mean for all hospital and university based programs. Two graduates scored in the top 3% of the nation, one in the top 4%, and one in the top 6%.

CCHS **Nursing** students scored higher in all areas of the NCLEX-RN than the national average, and its graduates passed the computer-adaptive test with significantly fewer questions administered than either the state or national averages, a further indication of content mastery.

One graduating **Paramedic** student scored a perfect 100% on the credentialing exam.

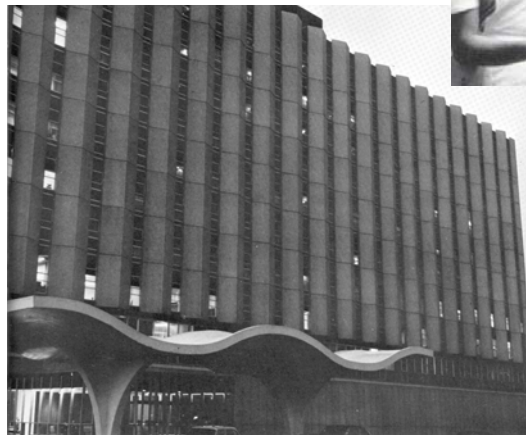
